This chart is intended to provide members with general equivalents between USAF and Corporate Uniforms and civilian dress in each uniform category. Uniform wear patterns, accoutrements, hats, outer garments, etc. are not represented here. See the appropriate paragraphs in CAPR 39-1 for specific wear information for that uniform.

** Per CAPR 39-1, Table 1-1: “The Corporate Working uniform may be worn in a flying, field or mission setting when USAF-style Class B or Aviator Shirt would be worn.” Additionally, the Corporate Working uniform has been added under “Corporate Service Dress” in the table. This does not mean that the Corporate Working Uniform replaces the USAF-style Class B or Aviator Shirt uniforms for the purposes of the “minimum uniform” in para 1.2.2 or 1.2.3. As always, you should gauge the level of formality of the event before wearing the Working Uniform.
