STEP ONE: COMPLETE THE GENERAL EMERGENCY SERVICES QUESTIONNAIRE

- Go to the CAP Emergency Services page:
<https://www.gocivilairpatrol.com/programs/emergency-services>
- On the left side, click on Education and Training
- Under Education and Training, click on [General Emergency Services Materials](#)
- You must take and pass the General Emergency Services (GES) Questionnaire:
 - It is an open-book “test”
 - You can use the slides, CAPR 60-3, and CAPR 173-3 (see below references)
 - This should take less than 30 minutes
 - If you fail, take it again, and again...

Once you pass the Questionnaire, you can now train to be a Ground Team Member!

CAP TEST 117 ES CONTINUING EDUCATION PART 1

This is specific to ground team members and is a quick **10-question quiz** about Critical Incident Stress Management (CISM). Although rare, ground team members may experience situations that, for some, causes stress. This quick overview identifies what Critical Incident Stress (CIS) is, how to identify it, and how to manage it. Like other tests you'll have to take, this is also "open book."

ICUT – INTRODUCTORY COMMUNICATIONS USER TRAINING

This is where you learn the basics of using tactical radios. It is a series of short videos followed by quizzes based on the short videos that you watched.

ICUT can be accomplished using the Learning Management System's (LMS) new AXIS LMS Portal, which must be accessed, by first logging into eServices, then clicking on [On-line Courses & Exams](#). Once you click on the hyperlink to Introductory Communications User Training, it will take to the AXIS LMS Portal.

SQTR's – SPECIALTY QUALIFICATION TRAINING RECORDS

The task guides are what give the instructions for each individual task on the SQTR's. There are three of these, which are specific to each area of Emergency Services. SQTR'S are the forms that track what is needed for each Operations training position. You can use these forms on the field training exercises to document on paper the items that you qualified in. This is needed because the SET (Skills Examiner Trainer) has to sign off at the time of the training. You can then bring the paper back and enter the information into eServices at your convenience.

NOTE: SQTR's are a check-off sheet that has to be signed off by someone who is qualified in the specialty that you are training towards and that person must hold the SET designator. During your training, you will be shown how to print off an SQTR sheet and then transcribe it into [eServices](#).

As an example, once you complete your GES and ICUT from the first two pages, those two tasks, which are required, will automatically show online as "accomplished" in your respective SQTR's. Each member should first strive to earn his or her Urban Direction Finding (UDF) team qualification. As such, you will begin by printing up the SQTR for UDF and bringing it with you to training to be signed off.

FEDERAL EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCY (FEMA) & THE INCIDENT COMMAND SYSTEM COURSES

That's right, more online courses and tests. To become a fully qualified Ground Team Member, specifically a GTM-3, you will have to accomplish two FEMA courses regarding the ICS.

[IS-100.c: Introduction to the Incident Command System, ICS 100](#)

This course should take approximately 2 hours.

[IS-700.B: An Introduction to the National Incident Management System \(NIMS\)](#)

This course should take approximately 3 ½ hours.

If this is your first time taking a FEMA course online, you will have to register for an account. This is very simple, but we recommend you **use your official CAP email address**. You will get an email with your FEMA Student ID (FEMASID), which you will need when taking classes.

BASIC FIRST AID TRAINING OR EQUIVALENT

Any standardized first aid course from a reputable organization such as the [American Red Cross](#), [American Heart Association](#), or even from a Scouting organization or other organization that provides a certificate of training will suffice. Medical training in Civil Air Patrol is for treating minor injuries such as scrapes and cuts one may get while walking through the woods. We are not an emergency medical

service and only treat what we train to treat. Nonetheless, this training is required to become a Ground Team Member.

How to get qualified...

There are four Ground Team Levels – this packet is to get you UDF and then GTM-3.

Ground Team Leader (GTL)

Ground Team Member Level 1 (GTM-1)

Ground Team Member Level 2 (GTM-2)

Ground Team Member Level 3 (GTM-3) ← this is what we are working towards here

Urban Direction Finding Team (UDF) ← this is just a stepping-stone to GTM-3

Ground Team Member (GTM) – Level 3 (see notes below).

- 1) Trainee Prerequisites. Satisfy the following to begin training for GTM-3: Qualified GES.
- 2) Qualified. Complete all requirements listed in the most current version of the Ground and Urban Direction Finding Team Task Guide for GTM-3.

Note 1: GTM-3 qualified members should be prepared to conduct basic ground team operations for up to 24 hours.

Achieving GTM Level 3 is what awards you the Basic Ground Team Badge



Urban Direction Finding Team (UDF) (see note below).

- 1) Trainee Prerequisites. Satisfy the following to begin training for UDF (see note): Qualified GES.
- 2) Qualified. Complete all requirements listed in the most current version of the Ground and Urban Direction Finding Team Task Guide for UDF.

Note: There is not a separate qualification for members and leaders on Urban Direction Finding Teams, but one member will be placed in charge, and operations must still meet the requirements for cadet protection and vehicle usage.

Gear for ground team members...

There are two categories of equipment used by Civil Air Patrol Ground Teams. They are the 24hr Search Load, and the 72hr Existence Load. The Search Load is what the searcher will carry when performing an actual search. All required items are found in the [Ground & Urban Direction Finding Teams Tasks Book](#) as indicated on the first page of this document. The Existence Load includes things like a backpack (rucksack), sleeping bag, extra food, clothes, socks, etc. This is generally carried for short distances and remain at a mission base while conducting search operations. The searcher can “live” out of his or her rucksack for up to 72 hours. The existence load can cost a lot of money when bought new, but there are creative ways to find everything you need for a lot less. Since it can take upwards of a year, sometimes a little longer, to get qualified, trainees can acquire these items piece by piece over time.

WARNING: Before going out and buying any of the more expensive equipment such as sleeping bags, tents, or even backpacks, reach out to some of the more experienced cadets or a qualified Ground Team Leader to discuss options. A sleeping bag is not a sleeping bag – they come in all shapes and sizes, and most important; they are rated to specific temperatures. This can be very important when we conduct overnight training during the colder months.

Are you required to participate in Emergency Services? No. However, if you to take part in field operations, you must have this equipment. As a trainee, you can do without most of the equipment, or borrow it. If you plan to be a qualified ground team member on our alert roster and consider yourself “mission capable”, then everything is required. The first step is to get the 24 hour gear, then worry about everything else.
