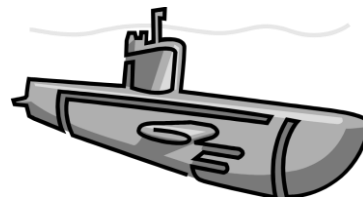

What is Civil Air Patrol?

THEN:

CAP was founded in 1941, before WWII began. During the war, it was responsible for conducting search & rescue, border patrol, and coastal patrol. Its' job on coastal patrol was to spot and sink German submarines. CAP did such a good job, that after the war, a German Admiral admitted



that C.A.P. drove the U-Boats from America's coasts, saving thousands of lives.

Little Rock Composite Squadron was formed less than two months after the war began and has been around ever since.

NOW:

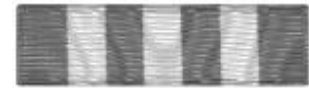
Today, over 27,000 youth from across the nation are members of C.A.P. Little Rock Civil Air Patrol cadets have been at hurricanes, floods, tornados, crashed airplanes, and more. We receive the same training as adults do and can serve as Ground Team Members on real Search & Rescues. We also frequently fly in C.A.P. and military aircraft.

About 10% of the Air Force Academy classes are C.A.P. cadets; we also go to West Point and Annapolis. C.A.P. cadets have gone on to become NASA astronauts and the Chief of Staff for the United States Air Force.
